Aligning care with Prognosis in Frail Older Adults: The Palliative and Therapeutic Harmonization (PATH) Program

SPEAKER: Dr. Paige Moorhouse

Dr. Moorhouse holds a B.Sc. from the University of Toronto and completed her MD and residency training in Internal Medicine and fellowship in Geriatric Medicine at Dalhousie University in 2007. She completed a Master's of Public Health at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health in 2008.

Dr. Moorhouse draws on her clinical experience to inspire her research in vascular cognitive impairment, executive function, and driving and dementia. She draws on her training in program development and implementation for her work in co-founding the Palliative and Therapeutic Harmonization (PATH) Program, the collaborative comprehensive geriatric assessment method, and for developing technology solutions for team-based care.

She is the principle investigator for several provincial and national grants including the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation the University Internal Medicine Research Fund. She was the 2007 recipient of the Kaufman Award for Research from the Canadian Geriatrics Society, and the 2006 recipient of the Award of Excellence from the Gerontology Association of Nova Scotia. She is a consultant for the Public Health Agency of Canada, the Canadian Stroke Network, and the Canadian Alzheimer's Society.
